Supporting Karun School

Trichy, India

The Inner Wheel Club of Reading Maiden Erlegh are holding a Charity Brunch on Saturday 14th May at 10.15am, at Charvil Village Hall in aid of Karun School. The school is our International Charity until June 2022.



St. Andrew's Church has always been great supporters of Karun and we hope we can entice you to a traditional English breakfast cooked and served by our Inner Wheel ladies.

Whilst the school was closed due to Covid, staff and the local administrator have had an opportunity to take stock of what has been achieved and consider the future direction of Karun. All teachers continued to come to school daily. Children who come to Karun are from disadvantaged backgrounds and many do not have facilities to access any available online lessons. During the week teachers travelled to surrounding villages to visit children in their homes for, one to one coaching, on the core subjects. They provided textbooks so that children could continue their work. Thankfully the school has now reopened.

The Trustees continue to work closely with Karun to explore vocational skills programmes that can be taught on the site whilst also supporting individuals on courses. Karun's popular weekend provision of IT and sewing classes for the women in the local community has been well received. Staff have for some time been considering a programme of vocational sewing classes that lead to a recognised certificate for young people.

This would enable them not only to learn valuable skills but also help them to either enter employment or set up a business of their own in a rapidly growing economy. With donations of sewing machines Karun has been able to introduce a programme of 3 classes per week for twelve weeks and sixteen young women have enrolled.

A local bank has been approached to provide advice to the students on how to set up a small business and where to access funding.



A fascinating morning was had in the Church Centre on 19 February when Rev Dr Andrew Goddard came along to give a presentation about the Church's project of Living in Love & Faith.

There were about 30 folks in attendance listening to the very comprehensive explanation of the background for this project – 'how do you think the Church of England should stand on the truth of God's word in a rapidly changing society?' – asking us all to think how we can engage and offer the good news of Jesus and respond with Christian love to all the challenges we face as individuals and as a Church.



We watched some powerful videos of individual people sharing their identity, sexuality, relationships and testimonies of life within the Church and the message that God accepts us as who we are.

We were encouraged as individuals and as a Church to listen, learn and give feedback on this very important project so that we can give a sense of direction towards the proposals and decisions to be taken by the General Synod in 2023.

Leading up to this there is a period of Learning & Listening (April – Sept 2022) – Discerning & Deciding (Dec 22 – Feb 23) all leading to decisions later in the year. There are plenty of resources so you can get involved and are encouraged to do so.

Knowl Hill News

Challenges for us all not least to hear what God is saying to the Church today and how He is shaping us.

Well, what to say in these troubled times. Unfortunately, we don't have much encouraging news yet re our St. Peter's project (hopefully to come) and we are all suffering to a greater or lesser extent from rising prices for petrol and household expenses but to quote (can't remember where it comes from) "this doesn't amount to a hill of beans" in the light of the sufferings of the Ukrainian people. I have just been looking at a collection of pictures of Ukrainian cities and countryside and how stunningly beautiful they are/were.

These could be rebuilt unlike the shattered lives of so many. We can only pray for the Ukrainian people and their continuing strength and resolve to fight for their country and that President Putin will call a halt to his murderous campaign in the very near future. I'm sure that the generous people of Knowl Hill will do what they can to help refugees.



The last article I penned for this magazine was in September 2020 when Mandy and I were about to leave Wargrave for a new life in Newport, South Wales. We recognised that we were needed there by her family and had already identified a church we were likely to join, Faith Church in Rogerstone just outside Newport.

I had retired from a banking career 18 months' earlier and no longer needed to be in Station Road for the commute and both of us had concluded that it was the right time to make this move now that I was no longer commuting into London. This was the start of a journey which has changed my life.

Through the summer of 2020 Mandy and I were busy organising the sale of our home in Station Road, which we had lived in for 28 years, and the purchase of a new one in Newport.

Time to move on and start the next chapter. Busy, busy and then the reality, for me, of feeling trapped in a place I didn't want to be. Mandy very happy in a familiar environment, I was spiralling downwards. As my mental health collapsed my physical health also disintegrated. Weight down from almost 13 stone to just over 10. Constipation without pain. I was burning up everything. Couldn't engage with anyone or anything. No escape. Tried medication in January 2021 but not for long. Wasn't well enough to make good decisions.

Mandy, our family and friends, desperate to find a way to help me but how? I was in turmoil and the trauma of these winter months took their toll on both of us. In early March Mandy has severe chest pain and is hospitalised twice. Tragically she then dies in her sleep having been released from hospital only a few hours earlier. It transpires that she had significant plaque in a section of her heart, but I find it very difficult not to link the trauma of those final months with her death.

Already depressed I now have the grief associated with Mandy's death. With a huge amount of help from my sister Mary, the three children and Mandy's family, a wonderful thanksgiving service is conducted at Faith Church. Then busy, busy

dealing with her estate, the sale of the Newport house and the purchase of a new one in Purfield Drive, back in Wargrave... and all of this during the ever-changing Covid lockdowns and restrictions.

Somehow, I find a way to get all this done and am now back in Wargrave. No longer busy I spiral downwards again and despite being in a place where I know a lot of people I'm really struggling. Don't want to engage with anyone or anything. Christmas passes, the winter months again take their toll.

How do I escape from this seemingly permanent dense fog in my mind? Feel useless and hopeless. Lost my wife, my family home, and my career. How do I find a way out of survival mode and start living again? Realise that I don't love myself, that I'm both angry and frustrated with myself. Blame myself for everything which has gone wrong.

My mind is destroying me, the blockage in there has to be removed. Was it a demon I needed to exorcise or just stuff that had accumulated in my mind? In late February I realise that not loving myself was really the problem. Screaming in the car and demanding that, in the name of Jesus, the blockage be cleared. Suddenly the fog has disappeared. I feel alive again.

This 18-month period has been horrendous in so many different ways.

The COVID pandemic has wreaked havoc in so many lives around the world and I think many of us are only now emerging from the wreckage it has left behind. This is at a time when the Ukraine crisis is reminding us how fortunate we have been in this country over the last, almost, 80 years during which peace has reigned.

We take so much for granted in the western world. One of my elderly Jewish clients always used to say to me that real poverty is when you have no food on the table for your family. This view has influenced my approach to life.

My personal wreckage is not unique, and I am definitely now emerging from it and can identify with the wonderful words in Romans 5: 3-4 about perseverance, character and hope.

There were times when I had to dig very deep to find the resilience and determination to keep going and I knew the Lord was supporting me throughout. His timing is a mystery to us all, but He delivered. I have become a much more rounded, open and empathetic person and am definitely the richer for what I have been through. I can now look forward not back, be proactive rather than reactive, and enjoy life again. I now have hope.

I am convinced that Mandy is now where she always wanted to be, albeit rather earlier than she had planned. The final sentence of her book, "Safe Haven", published in 2018 captures this beautifully:



In fact, Mandy was always adamant that she would be on His knee. Who am I to suggest otherwise?!

I now have a considerably better understanding of the mental health issues which can confront us in our lives. Before this journey I have been on, I would always have listened to anyone suffering from a mental health issue but wouldn't have known what to do or say because I couldn't empathise with it.

Now I'd like to reach out and help others where I can. If anyone reading this article would like a confidential chat with me, I'd love to hear from you.

The War in Ukraine: our response to cries for help

In the first week of March, St Mary's Wargrave joined with others in the community by organising a collection of emergency items for Ukrainians fleeing the war with Russia, or still in Ukraine.



Angie, my wife, took backpacks, sleeping bags, camping mats and duvets donated by church members and their neighbours to the Crazies Hill Ukraine Aid Van on 4th March (see Beccy Robinson's post on Wargrave Community Matters for details).

I took toiletries, first aid kits, wound dressings, men's socks, energy bars, blankets, nappies and baby food to the Reading Ukrainian Community Centre, on 5th March. Both have contacts on the ground (Beccy's partner Mark

has employees in Kiev and Lviv), so we can be sure that the items will reach people who need them.

With depots full within just a few days, the call was then for cash donations.

The RUCC recommends to hold jumble sales for any items that people still wish to donate, then send the proceeds to a DEC member that has staff on the ground, such as the British Red Cross, who have negotiated discounts with manufacturers that get far more items to those who need them than we could obtain at the same price; www.rucc.uk has further advice.





Jeremiah 29:11

Skeletons in the Churchyard

We tell the children that there are no ghosts in our churchyard but deep down they might feel a bit scared. Could this be because here are links to the past and a reminder of past lives? There are many stories to be told about some of approximately 17,000 skeletons in the churchyard.



We start with Wargrave's greatest benefactor, Mrs. Harriette Cooke Smith. She and her husband William are buried almost opposite the south door, about a dozen paces towards the bench alongside the far wall. Harriette was born in 1824, the daughter of the Reverend James Hitchings who was the vicar of Wargrave from 1826-1850. She married a prosperous businessman, William Smith, in her mid-thirties and they remained childless.

After a spell in London, they returned to Wargrave and made their home at Woodclyffe that is on the right hand side of the road towards Henley, just beyond the Willow Lane turning. Her generous bequests all carry that name — the Village Hall, the Hostel now housing the Library, the Almshouses and even the Allotments.

A chapter in the Book of Wargrave (published in 1986 by the Local History Society) tells the full story of her munificence.

Many people know Madame Tussauds as a Waxwork Museum in London, a major

tourist attraction displaying the waxworks of famous and historical figures, as well as popular film and television characters. Occasionally we get asked 'Where is **Madame Tussaud's** grave?'. The grave in question can be found close to the south door of the church and beside the weeping cherry tree. Here there is a gravestone with iron supports describing a certain **Elizabeth Tussaud**. Some books say that she is the Madame Tussaud who owned the famous waxworks in London – but that is not true. She was born as Elizabeth Elliott and had married Victor Tussaud, Madame Tussaud's



grandson. So, she was the grand-daughter-in-law to the lady of waxworks fame.

Elizabeth's parents William and Amelia Elliott had lived in the village and are buried in the churchyard so when Elizabeth died, she was buried here. Elizabeth Tussaud's name is on the other side of the tombstone for her mother, and her father's is alongside.

A question of Faith

Faith is to believe what we do not see

After Jesus' death and burial, he made several resurrection appearances. First, he appeared to the women in the garden outside the tomb in which his body had been placed. They rushed to tell the disciples who believed it was nonsense. Later, Jesus appeared among them and invited them to touch him, to dispel any doubts they may have had. This, his second appearance resonates with our situation today. The disciples were 'locked down', in fear for their lives. Their master had died. Jesus appeared from nowhere, in this locked room, suddenly and unexpected. Is there a message here for us? Christ can enter anywhere – in our homes, in our hearts, even now during our isolation and anxiety. Can we believe in the resurrection without seeing him? Thomas couldn't.

Thomas, one of the twelve disciples, was not with the others when Jesus came and refused to believe in the resurrection until he had proof – hence the expression 'Doubting Thomas'. He wanted to see for himself Jesus' hands with the imprints of the nails, touch them and also put his hands into his side, needing that direct personal experience. It's OK to doubt, to have difficulty in believing all of God's promises when we see the difficulties, tragedies and disappointments that colour our lives.

Doubt is something to struggle with to reach certainty because we cannot just adopt someone else's belief however well respected and authoritative they may be. We need to ask questions, a vital part of learning. We need proof, evidence, not fake news. Our journey of faith is affected by all we see, hear, and read; by the culture we are brought up in; by family, friends, colleagues and even strangers.



It can be exciting to follow the path with its twists in our faith journey, but it can also be challenging. Faith is about hope that nothing can separate us from God's love, that he will reach out to us in grace, mercy and forgiveness.

So, what does convince us? Is it an event? Is it some influence? And has belief changed the way we live our lives? Are we living signs of our faith in our relationships and all that we do? Too many questions but no-one can convince another person that there is a God. You can state the facts and point them to God, but convincing is done by God himself.

Covid & Easter by Mark Puddy



Two years ago, we were prisoners in our own homes, only able to get out to exercise for an hour a day, and it took that long to reach the front of the queue at Waitrose for socially distanced shopping. And there was rationing of flour and loo rolls.

One year ago, I was enjoying a month off work, having retired as a partner at the surgery. Our plan for a big trip to South Africa went out of the window. Instead, each day over the Easter Weekend, we had progressive visits from members of the family, bubble by bubble, for a chilly lunch outside. Later in the month we set off, listening on the radio to Prince Phillip's funeral, for a self-catering week in Devon, with the feeling that, after another long winter, it was wonderful to have a holiday.

Today, we now look forward to Easter 2022, with a full range of services planned in Church, and, if we are not actually laid low with Covid, we can meet with friends to eat and drink, travel in the UK and abroad, and go all we want to the theatre and football matches.

Even if we are infected with Covid (as I am when writing this) it is a minor cough and inconvenience, rather than a threat to life, if we have been appropriately vaccinated and are fortunate enough to have an immune system which works normally.

We cannot say that another, more serious variant of Covid, with more resistance to vaccination and existing immunity, will not develop. However, with 77% of the UK population fully vaccinated at the time of writing, the Government policy is that we are going to have to live with Covid, rather than lock down society yet again. This seems sensible, as the impact of potentially increased rates of infection will not result in as much harm to the whole population as the effects of a lockdown.

How does this fit with our Christian experience at Eastertime?

At Easter, we remember that Jesus, who took all our sins, was crucified, and then we celebrate his resurrection from the dead. Through this, we can move from the suspended death sentence hanging over all of us sinners, to a new life, a life guided by the Holy Spirit, and, in the future, with God in Heaven. We can have life and have it in abundance.

We have moved from suspended animation two years ago at the height of Covid, to the positivity of the current resumption of full life. While the transformation at Easter, from condemned sinners to everlasting life, is so much greater, we can still feel the joy of liberation from the oppression we have suffered under Covid during these past two years. We pray for those who have been scarred by Covid, that they will be healed and know the fullness of life, both in this world, and, through the miracle of Easter, in the life to come.

The Currants symbolise the many people who saw Jesus after he had risen.





Eco Church: Remembering Jimmy by Mike Buckland



It is with sadness that we learned at the weekend of the death of Lord James Remnant, former Patron of St Mary's Wargrave. There will no doubt be many tributes. His impact on aspects of what we now call Eco Church was significant. It is a legacy from which we all in Wargrave benefit but may not all be aware of.

"Jimmy", as those who knew him called him, supported initiatives which encouraged our interaction with nature at the heart of our community. In 2010 and 2011, a series of events coincided which were I believe led by God. This piece will mention just a few of them. The part he played was significant.

In June 2010, a packed St Mary's Wargrave hosted its first ever multi-media presentation. The late Sir John Houghton, a Christian, atmospheric physicist and Chairman of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, spoke on climate change, global warming and biodiversity loss. The evening attracted people from the village and beyond and proved to be the catalyst for the Wargrave Transition Group, a steering group for several volunteer-led projects. Sir John was a key figure in the Transition movement, which encourages local, sustainable projects in communities around the world.

Two of the projects were the communal orchard north of the Recreation Ground, and the Mumbery Hill Nature Reserve in 2011. Lord Remnant sold the land on the understanding that new homes in King's Acre and Harvest Place would be accompanied by natural spaces. The orchard was planted alongside the former, and a nature reserve was established adjacent to the latter. Lord Remnant wanted the Junior and Infants Schools to benefit, so the reserve has an outdoor classroom, and a football pitch which you see on the way in.

Do visit the reserve if you haven't already. It is a real gem, home to a wide variety of species, including several uncommon plants, trees and insects. Volunteers are welcome. Contact me or Helen Perry if you are interested. We meet there once a month on Saturday mornings.

Without Jimmy Remnant's initiatives, we would have neither of these amenities in our village. They are an important part of his legacy. As we pay tribute, let us be thankful.



Penny Miller, who founded the Wargrave Transition Group, is sadly no longer with us either. Her own project was the Chalk Pit nature reserve next to Wargrave Cemetery. Created in her memory in the place she fought for, this too is a jewel of nature. Do visit it and, if you would like to help tend it, I or Tessa Baird can put you in touch with Phil, Penny's husband, or you can of course contact him directly. All of these projects are run by volunteers.

Around 20 people braved the rainy weather on February 20th to share our heart for the nation of Japan and to talk a bit about the work we will be a part of there with Youth with a Mission.

For both of us Japan has been a place that had interested us from an early age - Len's mother worked there when he was a child and so he heard a lot through her and for me I took an interest in some social issues that I learnt about in geography at school - but neither of us envisioned at the time that we would be moving there many years later.


