VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Parish Family

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned - (Isaiah 9:2)



It probably was not a "bleak midwinter" when Jesus was born. Given the climate in Palestine, there probably was "no frosty wind moaning", and it is highly unlikely that "snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow." But these haunting lines from the 19th century poet Christina Rosetti's poem, now known as the Christmas carol "In the bleak midwinter", still ring profoundly true.

By describing the Lord Jesus coming in the harshest of winters, Christina Rosetti painted a harsh world in desperate need of hope. Her words "earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone" point beyond to the literal state of human hearts - wounded and hardened by pain and death.

Let us remember that in our bleakest winters, the Lord Jesus comes. The One who, as Rosetti wrote, "cherubim worship night and day", was content with the humility of living "fully human in every way" (Hebrews 2:17). He entered our world, sharing in our humanity to free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death" (Hebrews 2:15). He came to forever free us from the grip of death in our hearts, so we can experience joy.

This is a gift beyond words and repayment. As Rosetti concluded, "What can I give Him, poor as I am?" The carol concludes by reminding us "yet what I can give him... is my heart."

Martin Niemöller (1892-1984) was a prominent German Lutheran pastor. At first, he had welcomed National Socialism, later opposing it because of its pagan tendencies, and moved to supporting the Confessing Church. His anti-Nazi activities meant he was arrested in 1937. He was confined in a concentration camp due to his continued opposition to Hitler.

On Christmas Eve 1944, Niemöller spoke to his fellow prisoners in Dachau: "My dear friends, on this Christmas... let us seek, in the Babe of Bethlehem, the One who came to us in order to bear with us everything that weighs down heavily upon us... God Himself has built a bridge from himself to us! A dawn from on high has visited us!"

There will probably be, in a whole host of ways, bleak winters. Christmas invites us, as Rosetti knew herself, to embrace the good news that God, in Christ has come to us wherever we are and has bridged the gap between us. He invades our prison of darkness with His light providing light where we are lost, offering to lift our load of guilt, coming alongside us in sorrow or loneliness as well as in the countless other matters which weigh us down. On that bleak Christmas Eve in Dachau Concentration Camp, Niemöller continued, "out of the brilliance that surrounded the shepherds a shining ray will fall into our darkness."

His words echo the dawning light Isaiah the prophet saw from afar, and which Rosetti captures so wonderfully in her carol. No matter where we are or what we face the Lord Jesus Christ offers, if we will recognize Him, to penetrate our darkness with His joy and light and bleak winters with the warmth of His presence.

12 TIPS OF CHRISTMAS CARE

At Christmas we celebrate God coming to earth in human flesh to rescue the world He created. What better gift can we give in return than to care for it? Here are some practical ways in which we can show we care. Whatever you do, be gentle on yourself and be realistic, but challenge yourself too.



- 1. Support overseas farmers buy Fairtrade.
- 2. **Rent a tree**: countryliving.com Search 'Rent a Christmas Tree' or reuse an artificial tree, decorate a living one in your garden with lights and bird food.
- 3. Go for a natural wreath and decorations. See what you can find.
- 4.**Re-use cards and wrapping**. Buy recycled (lower ecological footprint) and make sure to recycle. Remember to remove the sellotape before you do so.
- 5. Create homemade gifts. Baked goods, a glass or vase filled with chocolates or flowers, Kilner jars filled with goodies, all make great gifts.
- 6. Don't let your gifts cost the earth. Many beauty products contain palm oil whose production causes deforestation, air pollution and human rights abuses.
- 7. **Give the gift of time**. Consider offering to cook for someone regularly, take them for a coffee, babysit, or clean their house. Put a 'gift of time' voucher in a card.
- 8. **Dim the lights but not the joy**! You could make your table festive with candles made from beeswax avoid paraffin-based ones.
- 9. Practise generosity and hospitality. Invite someone over for Christmas Day.
- 10. Try some **meat-free meals**. A lot of meat production causes overgrazing of land, deforestation, habitat loss, pollution, and intensive use of water or fossil fuels. If you eat meat, make sure it's local, organic and free-range.
- 11. **Recycle right**. More waste ends up in landfill over Christmas than during the rest of the year. Find out what you can recycle where at recyclenow.com/recycling-locator.
- 12. **Co for walks.** Nature needs us, and we need nature. Visit arocha.org.uk/wild-christian/ for ways to enjoy, nurture and defend nature.

In the east, wise men are searching the sky, watching the rise of a dazzling new star, its brilliance dimming all the others.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY: Lest we forget Annette Dart

The annual Remembrance service in Wargrave took place on Sunday 12 November in St Mary's with over 300 people gathered together, including representatives from the local branch of the Royal British Legion and all our village Guiding and Scouting groups in attendance. After the impact of Covid and lockdowns on previous years' remembrance services, it was wonderful to be able to come together with our young people's groups and restore remembrance as a fully community occasion.



It is hard to believe that the war in Ukraine looks set to continue into a third year and another terrible conflict began in Gaza only a couple of weeks before we came together to remember our fallen Service men and women from two World Wars. The opening procession was accompanied by the rousing hymn 'Lift high the cross,' with Bob Austen leading and holding the cross aloft.

The Collect prayer for the day took on an extra significance as violent protests and marches connected with the Gaza conflict took place in cities around the UK.



REMEMBRANCE 2023

O God of truth and justice,

We hold before you those whose memory we cherish, and those whose names we will never know. Help us to lift our eyes above the torment of this broken world and grant us the grace to pray for those who wish us harm. As we honour the past, may we put our faith in your future; for you are the source of life and hope, now and for ever.



The service was led by The Revd Canon John Cook and included Bible readings from Denise Simpson (Mark 15: 33-40) and 11-year-old Charles Monte (15: 13-17) with the poignant words:

'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends'.

Major General Rob Thomson CBE DSO gave the sermon. He talked about the nature of courage through three men who have inspired him; Staff Sergeant Oz Schmid, his bomb disposal expert who lost of life while diffusing a bomb in Afghanistan in 2009; Noel Chavasse, a Christian doctor serving in the First World War and winning two Victoria Crosses for bravery and his third inspirational man is Jesus Christ, who demonstrated the 'most awe-inspiring physical, moral, emotional and spiritual courage on the cross'. The Major General left us with this thought-provoking question, 'How will you answer Christ in the days ahead?'

The Revd Richard Eves led the prayers of intercession with Tad Riley from the Cubs, Toby Bingham from the Scouts and Lydia Calverley from the Guides offering prayers for all those who fight, are wounded and bereaved. Lydia's prayer for peace struck a special chord as the world struggles with the sudden latest war in the Middle East.



Creator of all people, who marks out their appointed times and the boundaries of their lands, we pray for the nations of the world and their leaders. Would you restrain all those who seek to do evil, all who are motivated by pride and vainglory, and all those who harbour hatred towards their fellow creatures. Would you reign in the hearts of all mankind, we ask, that there might be peace.

The closing procession continued from the church onto Mill Green for the Service at the War Memorial, and many more people from Wargrave joined in. The St. Sebastian Wokingham Band played again this year, leading the hymns which included 'O God our help in ages past,' 'I vow to thee my country' and 'Abide with me.' The service followed the familiar and poignant order with prayers, followed by the Roll of Honour for those from Wargrave who lost their lives in the service of their country in both world wars.

The Last Post sounded out by the solitary trumpet on a hushed Mill Green before the 2minute silence and then the piercing sound of the Reveille. Following the laying of wreaths, 69 memorial crosses were planted by the Wargrave Scouts and Guides, and a further 19 memorial crosses by representatives of the Piggott School in memory of former pupils and also families of those named on the memorial also planted crosses.

The remembrance service always includes the Exhortation before the last post 'They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old, age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn, at the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember them', and the Kohima Epitaph 'When you go home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today'.

We hear these beautiful tributes every year and they never fail to elicit sadness, anguish, respect and pride all at once.



CARING FOR OUR CHURCHYARD Ruth Howse



Saturday mornings are often a busy time in St Mary's Churchyard, and teams of keen mowers keep the grass under control. We also have the 'Let it grow' zone where wild flowers are being actively encouraged and a less frequent pattern of scything is in place.

Mike, Angie and Ruth had a lovely time scything and preparing areas for sowing wild flower seeds on Saturday 28th October. A big thank you goes to the wonderful children who then helped Mike and Angie sow the yellow rattle seeds in the churchyard during November.

The wildflower area is very special to Mike and Angie, as their grandchildren Joel and Isla helped to sow this year's spring flowers in April, the week before Joel's tumour was diagnosed.

Unlike most flowers, yellow rattle takes its nutrients from grass roots not the soil. This weakens the grass and gives the wild flowers a better chance to grow. It is often called "nature's lawnmower".



Sowing yellow rattle is considered best practice for places where long grass takes a bigger hold than we want it to. Seeds must be sown in the autumn, on or near to the surface of the soil, and they need a frost in order to germinate. Once yellow rattle is established, it self-seeds. This is the third time that it has been planted in the past three years, and it's been great to have children from the church involved in planting. The very first seeds were sown by children from our church in October 2022; we are grateful to Christine for instigating that. Annie and the Junior Church helped last year.

Grass cutting has now stopped for the winter, and if you're interested in joining the team of mowers next spring, please contact Bob Austen, or why not pop down on Saturday 2nd December at 9am to help with the Annual Leaf Clearing of Mill Green.

MUMBERY FIELD NATURE RESERVE Helen Perry

Mumbery Field nature reserve has been managed by a small group of volunteers since 2011. The field at the outset was grass and brambles with a large number of native trees some of which were choked by the brambles. Over the years an outdoor classroom was created and a pond excavated. In creating a wild flower meadow, yellow rattle seeds were sown. As the yellow rattle plants spread they helped to thin out the grass. This allowed dormant wild flower seeds to develop and create a floral display as shown in the photographs taken back in the summer.





Over the years a number of the brambles have been cut back and cleared encouraging mainly oak and damson trees to grow more freely. The cut brambles are used to make a dead hedge creating wildlife habitats. In several areas of the reserve, hedgelaying of the hawthorn shrubs has taken place alongside the dead hedges. Grass snakes, sloe worms, bats, moths, butterflies, insects and many species of birds have been identified at the reserve over the years. Pond invertebrates have also flourished.

In late summer after the flowers have died back, the grass is cut by using scythes and allowed to dry, weather permitting. The dried grass is baled up using a box baler, which was made by a former volunteer before he moved away from Wargrave. This year around 20 bales were made and given away.

Our working party meet on the 3rd Saturday of each month and would welcome new volunteers, so please get in touch with Helen Perry or Mike Buckland.

Born in Swindon, I have spent the majority of my years living in the South East, settling in Crazies Hill, with my husband Rog, in 2006.

Introduced to church life from an early age by Mum, I attended Langley Baptist Church throughout my teenage years. Although I believed 'something', I didn't feel confident enough to make any firm commitment, and on leaving home, (and without Mum's influence), thoughts of God were soon left behind.

Rejecting university, I began working for Marks & Spencer, joining a training scheme which led to my appointment as a Departmental Manager, working in different stores around the country. I met Rog when both working in the Reading store. We married in 1982, and soon after, we both moved to buying departments at M&S's Head Office; me in textiles and Rog in the food division.

My career break came with the birth of Laura followed by Jonathan. When they were old enough for school, I worked part-time in a school for children with special needs. It was this experience that convinced me to become a teacher. I gained an O.U. degree, completed my teachers' training and was appointed as an English teacher at Cox Green Secondary School. Despite the stresses and strains of teaching teenagers, I loved my work, especially when teaching less able pupils in need of additional help.

Having spent 10 years at Cox Green, the final five as Head of Department, I moved to St. Mary's School for girls in Ascot. After a year, however, I required an unexpected brain operation, leading to my early retirement in 2014.



The operation, although successful, also left me with severe anxiety, which I still battle with daily.

In 2016, following a series of traumatic events, I suffered a nervous breakdownthe worst time of my life, and perhaps also the best, as God re-entered my lifefor good this time! Discharged from the clinic, one Sunday I felt compelled to go to church and was moved to tears by the whole experience. After this, Camilla and I prayed together weekly. During one of our prayer times, when feeling particularly distressed, I cried out for Jesus to help me and almost immediately I felt at peace.

I experienced a sense of total serenity and I knew that the despair that plagued me might finally retreat. I had hope for the future. Despite rejecting the Lord for so many years, He had never given up on me and had brought me back to where I belonged.

Since joining St Mary's I've been involved in several areas. Currently, I am co-ordinator for the Nurturing CoG and co-leader of the 'Seeking Wisdom' bible study group and - oh yes, the best news of all: I was confirmed in October 2022.

PCC UPDATE Sheila Williams - PCC Secretary

The PCC met on 13th November 2023

At this meeting Peter Dart, Director of Music at St Mary's, was invited to make a presentation to the Committee. He reviewed the success and variety of musical experiences provided during his 12 years in the role - from modern songs in family services to classical concerts.

He highlighted a particular need for more male voices in the lower register to join the music group – and indeed any new members would be welcomed to boost the number in the pool of singers and musicians for certain times of the year e.g. holiday periods and special services.

He shared his vision of possible musical developments to enhance our range of services and the PCC undertook it to look at his ideas for the future.

Other items discussed included

- The installation of LED lighting at Knowl Hill
- A new programme to be provided by the Parish for local schools
- The possibility of employing a Youth Worker at St Mary's
- Announcement that Mike Buckland appointed Deanery Environment Co-Lead
- Confirmation Safeguarding Training has and continues to take place for all those undertaking roles requiring this
- Churchwarden Sue Witney has now completed her certification for the Leadership Pathway in this important area.

It was also agreed that the "Roadmap" produced for the Parish some years ago should be regularly reviewed and updated. This would take place at every PCC Meeting when specific areas of ministry would be reviewed in rotation. Any members of the congregation who would like to suggest changes or developments in the life of the Church in Wargrave and Knowl Hill are encouraged to speak to a member of the Clergy or the PCC. The "Roadmap" was designed to be a living document reflecting where the Parish is, and where it is going – all members of the Church are encouraged to participate in its evolution – it is "our" roadmap.

CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY ACTION: Appeal for Volunteers Patricia Vella

Many of you will be familiar with Christian Community Action (CCA) charity in Reading.

For the last 30 years it has helped people in furniture poverty in Reading by providing them with second hand furniture. It has grown to include 4 charity shops as well as a second hand furniture shop whilst continuing to provide essential furniture, bedding and kitchen packs to those living in deprivation.

Despite the affluence of many areas in and around Reading three of our shops operate in areas that have people amongst the bottom 5% most deprived in the country and the remaining shop in Reading operates in an area with people in the bottom 10% most deprived in the country. (In contrast Wargrave is one of the less deprived areas of the country).

CCA is currently being led by a Wargrave resident Patricia Vella on a voluntary basis as she overhauls it's strategy and operating processes to set it up for the next 30 years and she urgently needs help from other professionals. FAITHFULLY SERVING THE LORD John Cook

...Ahab went to meet Elijah. When he saw Elijah, he said to him, "Is that you, you troubler of Israel? "I have not made trouble for Israel", Elijah replied. "But you and your father's family have. You have abandoned the Lord's commands and have followed the Baals "

On November 17th, the General Synod of the Church of England voted to encourage the bishops to make available same-sex blessing services on an 'experimental basis'. It might be that some of these services could start being used before too long.





A number our church family have left us since this was first mooted a few years ago, and moved to other churches as they felt they could not with integrity remain and attend a Church of England church with the direction of travel in our denomination. The motion was passed by the tightest of margins: just 51% in favour and 49% against amongst the non-ordained Synod representatives. The pattern amongst the clergy was similar. Even among the bishops, the vote in favour was just 62%. The General Synod (which I served on for twenty years) was a house divided.

Real questions have emerged about the process followed. Normally for major changes of official doctrine or liturgy Synod is required to have a two thirds majority, recognizing the need for consensus and that such changes can never be made liahtly. However, the bishops who promoted the motion dodged this on a technicality by using the word 'experimental'. They promised supporting materials, but these were never provided.



They also, it appears, had received legal advice which they did not make public. That has never happened before. Usually at the General Synod all papers are circulated to the laity, clergy, and bishops. The Bishop of Rochester who courageously spoke against the motion. warned of a resulting breakdown in trust in the bishops - and this has occurred.

The grief at this goes beyond mere process. This does not stem from homophobia as some suggest. Listening to the debate a number of those who spoke against the motion spoke candidly of their own experience of same sex attraction. In our churches we welcome all to come to hear the life- changing news of the Lord Jesus Christ. What is so serious at this time is that our Lord's words which are so clear are being ignored and brazenly disregarded; His Lordship and His government of His church rejected. The world-wide church across all denominations (with the exception of Europe and the USA) are continuing with the historic Biblical understanding of marriage being between a man and a woman.



This is a watershed moment, because the Church of England's founding documents show we are a denomination which is supposed to be governed by the words of the Lord Jesus in the Bible. In rejecting them we are rejecting Him.



One of my clergy colleagues was at a very large meeting in Oxford this week, and it is clear much disruption will now follow. Do read the words of Jesus in Revelation 2: 18-29, where He calls His people not to tolerate those who promote sin.

Churches who hold to His truth are distancing themselves from bishops and other churches



This means we are already seeing churches who hold to His truth distancing themselves from bishops and other churches who do not. Local working relationships are, with regret, across England being suspended.

Many churches will be accused of being disruptive and schismatic. So also, was Elijah in 1 Kings 18: 16-18. The background is that King Ahab had led the nation away from the true and living God, to worship gods of human invention. Elijah prayed drought upon the land, to bring the king to his senses. Ahab then accused Elijah of being a troublemaker. See how the prophet replied: it has a very contemporary ring!

This has serious implications for our churches here in Wargrave and in Knowl Hill. Please join me in praying for wisdom as we look to faithfully serve the Lord Jesus here.
