



MUSIC FOR REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

Peter Dart, Director of Music

For many in our congregation singing the hymns and songs provides an opportunity to express emotions in our hearts that are hard to articulate. Our best hymns do that. For this year's Remembrance Service at St Mary's, our music will be reflective, expressive and stirring as we remember and honour the sacrifice of our Armed forces and emergency services who gave their lives for the peace of our nation. We will also pray for peace amidst the ongoing trauma of war raging in Ukraine and now the Middle East. Here is a summary and background for the hymns we will sing, with the first verse or refrain of each.

Lift high the cross by George Kitchin

Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim, Till all the world adore His sacred name.

This hymn was published in 1887 with words by George Kitchin when he was Dean of Winchester and set to the melody of 'Crucifer' by Sydney Nicholson. It is based on the biblical text of Matthew 16 v 24 and powerfully expresses the cross as a symbol of God's love and the resurrection of Jesus. It is often sung during Lent and Holy Week but is a fitting choice for Remembrance Sunday with its references to the battle of Christ's triumph over death 'Come, Christians, follow where thy Captain trod, Our king victorious, Christ, the Son of God'.

One of Charles Wesley's most widely sung hymns and a wonderful example of his sublime spiritual poetry. It first appeared in 1747 and is based on the theme of God's perfect love and was sung at the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II last year. The hymn was inspired by a poem by John Dryden and set to music by Henry Purcell. It is set around a progression of thoughts, from our prayers for the Holy Spirit through to praying for the second coming of Our Lord and finally prayers for his new creation. Wesley was reputed to write ten lines of verse every day for 50 years and some while riding on horseback to his evangelical meetings! What a wonderful legacy of congregational songs he created.



Love divine by Charles Wesley

Love divine, all loves excelling, Joy of Heav'n to earth come down, Fix us in Thy humble dwelling; All thy faithful Mercies crown. Jesus, thou art all compassion Pure, unbounded love Thou art; Visit us with Thy salvation Enter every trembling heart. Lord of all Hopefulness was written in 1931 by Joyce Torrens under the name of Jan Struther. It is set to the melody of an Irish folk tune called 'Slane', named after the hill of Slane in Ireland. Joyce is best known for her character 'Mrs Miniver', created for her column in The Times newspaper and the subsequent novel, consisting of sketches of family life before World War II. The film version was a blockbuster, winning six academy awards in 1942. Joyce had a difficult life and suffered from deep depressions for which she was hospitalised. This beautifully simple hymn describes an ordinary day of trusting Jesus and asking him to be with us from our waking to our sleeping, and at the end of our days.

Lord of all hopefulness by Jan Struther Lord of all hopefulness. Lord of all iov.


Whose trust, ever child-like, no cares could destroy, Be there at our waking, and give us we pray, Your bliss in our hearts, Lord, at the break of the day.



Lord, for the years is such a wonderful hymn by the skillful and prolific hymn writer Timothy Dudley-Smith who is now 96 years old, set to music by Michael Baughen. It has been acclaimed as one of the 20th century's finest hymns with its timeless quality and strong sense of the Holy Spirit moving in our lives and looking to the future. It has beautiful vibrant phrasing such as his description of the word of God that 'speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze'.

VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Parish Family

John has asked me to write this months' letter, and as we are currently in the throes of preparation for Remembrance Sunday, I wanted to reflect a little on why we do this, every year. Who is the remembrance season for?

Most of us mark this time of year in one way or another. We buy a poppy and wear it. Perhaps we keep the two minutes' silence, if we're not traveling and remember the time. We might attend a Remembrance Sunday service or an act of remembrance at the local war memorial. Maybe we even march in a parade, uniformed and dignified.

But the question remains - who do we do all of these things for? Who is the intended beneficiary of all of this remembering? In some cases the answer is obvious; we buy poppies, for example, to help care for serving and ex-serving men and women, and their families. And quite right too. The Lord instructs us to have special concern for the care of 'widows and orphans', and so such giving is an integral and joyous part of our Christian discipleship.

However, for much else of our remembering the answer is not so obvious. Who benefits from the moment of silence, the reading of the names, the solemnity and reverence?

For a long time I thought that the beneficiaries were those we were remembering. As if by keeping their names spoken, if only briefly, we were in some small way repaying them for their sacrifice. Making sure that they get the honour they deserve for the sacrifices they made. There is a sense of reciprocity in our remembrance.

And yet, as Christians we know that the reciprocity of praise and honour from other human beings is of relatively little value. Jesus teaches in Matthew 6: 1-4 that if a person 'receives their reward in full' in the praises and honour of other human beings, they have missed out on the much greater reward that God offers to those who give of themselves to protect and provide for others.

So we oughtn't to think of our remembrance as reward or recompense for the fallen. The Lord is the one who honours and rewards those whose love and courage leads them to lay down their bodies and lives. And nothing that we can offer is worth comparing with His approval and commendation. For those remembered, our acts of remembrance are a light thing when compared with the way in which the Lord remembers and esteems their sacrifice.

Remembrance then, is not for the benefit of the remembered, but for the benefit of us who remember. As Christians we are a people who remember. And we remember because we are a people of gratitude.



66 The Lord has done great things for us and we are glad



Again and again in the Bible, the Lord's people are reminded not to be forgetful of all the great things that the Lord has done for them, but rather to call them to mind, daily. And throughout the Bible, the remembrance of those who have been used by the Lord in doing those great things, from the greatest to the least, is a source of yet more gratitude. We are grateful to them, for their courage and service and love on our behalf, and grateful to the Lord, who was the source of that courage and service and love.

In remembering with gratitude the great things that have been done for us, our affections are sharpened towards the good, the noble and the honourable. In remembering those who laid down their lives for the love of others, our hearts come to prize such love, and rejoice in such sacrifice. We delight in the good that has been done to us, and in turn become more the kind of people who will do that good to others. The Lord uses our remembrance to make us a more fitting people for Him who is greatest among all those who have, for love, laid down their life for their friends.

This remembrance season, let's remember, with gratitude, for our own sakes.

MAJOR GENERAL ROB THOMSON CBE DSO

On Sunday 12th November we will be joined by Major General Rob Thomson as our guest speaker during our 9.45am Remembrance Service at St Mary's.

Rob joined the Royal Green Jackets in 1989 after graduating with an Upper Second in History from Magdalene College, Cambridge. He has a Master's degree with distinction from King's College, London.

With his regiment he served in the UK, Germany, Norway, Canada, Bosnia, Northern Ireland, Kosovo and Afghanistan, soldiering in armoured, mechanised, arctic and light role battalions

Outside the Regiment, he has instructed Officer Cadets at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst and worked in the outer office for the 2* Chief of Staff in the main Army Headquarters in Wilton. In 2005 he spent six months working for the US in the Iraqi MOD in Baghdad and was then a staff officer in the UK's standby military headquarters where, amongst other things, he helped to evacuate UK citizens from Beirut to Cyprus in 2006.

He commanded 2 RIFLES, an infantry Battalion based in Northern Ireland, deploying to Kosovo in 2008 to support a French brigade based near Pristina, and then to Afghanistan in 2009 where he commanded a Battle Group of 1100 soldiers in Sangin in Helmand Province.

On of Afghanistan, the back he commanded the UK's Operational Training and Advisory Group, responsible for training those preparing for operations overseas. He then commanded 38 (Irish) Brigade in Northern Ireland before being the Deputy Commander of Regional Command (South West), deploying for a year to Helmand Province, Afghanistan in February 2014 as part of a US Headquarters, transitioning security responsibilities to the Afghan National Security Forces in October 2014.



On his return in 2015, he led a project directed by the head of the British Army to enhance the General Staff (all officers of the rank of Colonel and above). specifically to create professional body of valued senior leaders and staff officers bound together by a common ethos and loyalty to the Army as a whole, with intellectual rigour being at the very heart of what it does.

In 2016 - 2017, he attended the Centre des Hautes Etudes and the Institut des Hautes Etudes de la Défense Nationale at the Ecole Militaire in Paris before becoming the Defence Attaché in the UK's Embassy in Paris in September 2017 for two years, working as a soldier-diplomat. He has a good proficiency in French.

He became Administrator of the Sovereign Base Areas on the island of Cyprus (1 of the UK's 14 Overseas Territories and the only one administered through our MOD) and Commander British Forces Cyprus on 25 September 2019 and left the Army in January 2023.

He is now CEO of AGL Communication, a London based company which helps people to communicate at their best.

He is married to Hils and they have 5 children. He loves cricket, his new road-bike, history especially lesser known military biographies, good food and exploring new places.

POETRY PIECES

POETRY UP CLOSE



JOHN McCRAE (1872-1918)

John McCrae was a Canadian Lieutenant-Colonel serving as a soldier and doctor during World War I. He worked as a surgeon during the Second Battle of Ypres in Belgium, writing this composition there. He is particularly remembered for this poem, 'In Flanders Fields', published in 'Punch' magazine in December 1915.

Transferring from the trenches in 1915, McCrae tended the wounded at a dressing station in Ypres whilst battles continued. Sadly, his best friend, 22-year-old Alexis Helmer, was killed. It is thought that McCrae wrote this poem whilst gazing at where his friend was buried, with many others: in makeshift graves, marked only by wooden crosses, sited in a field adorned with wild poppies gently blowing in the breeze. It was the image of bright red blooms growing through the ravaged ground surrounding the crosses that inspired McCrae to write the poem.

'In Flanders Fields' sums up the harsh realities faced by all who were fighting at the Western Front, whilst the final verse contains a call to arms for those at home. Though many died, the speaker calls on the reader to 'take up our quarrel'. In that way those who had sacrificed their lives could 'sleep' in peace.

In Flanders Fields (1915)

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe;
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high,
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders' Fields.

McCrae soon transferred to a French hospital but by was now disillusioned by the war. His health began to fail and he died of pneumonia in 1918, just months before the war ended.

'In Flanders Fields' led to the adoption of the poppy as the flower of Remembrance, still worn every year across the world on November 11th. It not only reminds us of those who

have fought and died in all wars, sacrificing their lives for their country, but it also represents hope for a positive future and a world at peace.

Poppies no longer grow in Flanders Field. The area now sites WWI memorials and museums. The grave of Alexis Helmer has unfortunately been lost.

FROM ENERGY AUDIT TO ACTION

Around 60 people from 30 local churches attended St John's & St Stephen's Church in Reading for a morning of talks, group work and panel discussion on how to implement a church energy audit.

In our Parish, St Mary's & St Peter's churches were audited in 2010 and 2020. (Electronic copies are available by email on request)

The event was chaired and introduced by Hannah Mann, the Oxford Diocese's Environment Officer. Matt Fulford, our 2020 auditor, explained the Church of England's ambitious strategy to get its assets to net zero carbon by 2030. Over 7% of churches are already net zero, with 100% electricity the norm. The key first step, he said, is to know the real use of a building: heating solutions vary accordingly. All week? Weekends only? For what?

Churches and church schools are asked to implement energy audit recommendations and plan for boiler end of life. July 2022 faculty rule changes have made it easier to obtain permission e.g. under pew heating. Each church uses an Energy Footprint Tool to calculate its carbon footprint according to nationally agreed criteria.

The Oxford Diocese, which includes Berkshire, is seeing an overall drop in church energy use. Hannah explained its audit update process to move churches on from audits of a few years ago.



For the panel Q&A, the speakers were joined by Hannah Robertson from the Diocesan Advisory Committee. The DAC's role is partly similar to conservation officers in planning applications, whilst offering support on insulation, draught proofing, guttering, broken windows, floors, heating, solar pv and electric charging points. Heating, she said, accounts for around 70% of church energy use. A guiding principle is that church buildings must aid mission. Heatable cushions and mats, movable radiators and under pew heating solutions were on display (see photo).

The morning ended with questions from the floor on underfloor heating, biomass, batteries, solar pv and vicarages, for which the Diocese appointed a Property Director on 1st August.

ARCHDEACON'S INSPECTION VISIT

Just like CQC inspect healthcare institutions and OFSTED call on schools, the Church of England has a process for checking that Churchwardens work hard to ensure the smooth running of the Church & Buildings. This is the very important Archdeacon's Inspection Visit. In the old days, all Churches would be visited once a year. Bob Austen says they visited every year for 18 years when he was churchwarden. They never found anything wrong. I think that they must have had their suspicions to keep coming back.



Even before Covid, the visits had become less frequent but it couldn't last and inevitably this summer St Mary's, Wargrave received its inspection call up. We were sent a list of questions and Sue and I worked hard to amass all the required information. We were very grateful for the organisation of the Parish Office, and for information provided by our two wise advisors Peter Mayes and Christine Walker. 3 weeks before the visit, we were sent another completely different and much longer questionnaire, so heads down, we worked through this. We sent back a lot of information electronically, and produced impressive folders with all the other information, ready for the big day.

Our assessors, Revd. Jane Kraft and John Sutton, the Lay Chair of the Sonning Deanery, arrived on time. Fortified by strong coffee and Waitrose's finest biscuits, together we walked around the church and churchyard, and clipboards in hand, looked at the many church processes and policies, the safe storage of valuables and countless other checks, undoubtedly impressing them with our newly acquired detailed knowledge

Two and a half hours later, it was over! As Sue and I are relatively new to the job it was useful to be made to look through various areas and we do feel that we now have a better grasp on things. Jane and John are yet to visit St Peter's and St Paul's, after which they will compile their report on the Parish and we will relax until the next time.

Despite the pressures the work can bring, Kay loves her work and can't imagine doing anything else.

Looking back, Kay remembers attending Sunday School in Twyford and, when the family moved to Knowl Hill, she joined the Cirl Guides, automatically becoming involved in the church by attending specific festivals. Kay was confirmed at the age of 17, although, on reflection, she feels that she was too young to fully understand the implications of this and underneath remained unsure of what it actually meant. As a result, she doesn't feel she was committed to the Lord at this stage.

Time moved on and Kay married Jim in 2005. As he attended St Andrew's UR Church, Kay naturally accompanied him, still feeling like a 'fair-weather' Christian, attending mostly on special occasions e.g. Easter and Christmas.

In 2012, Kay's mum, living alone since Kay's dad's death, was admitted to hospital following a fall. Leaving Jim in Wokingham, where they were living, Kay returned 'home' to look after the dogs and prepare for her mum's return. Unfortunately, Kay's mum died in hospital and didn't return home.

Following discussions, Kay and Jim moved into the 'family' house. Needing modernisation, they began planning changes



to update their new home.

Within a year, however, Jim was diagnosed with lung cancer and plans were delayed somewhat. Nevertheless, alterations were eventually completed, and Kay is grateful for the time they had in their newly refurbished home before Jim died in 2016. She treasures the memory of how Jim loved living in the home he had helped create and is also comforted by reminiscences of her parents there.

Following Jim's death, Kay felt blessed to have friends around her, but always rejected invitations to become involved in activities. Realising that she was becoming isolated, Kay took the plunge and began to say 'yes'. She was introduced to Lesley Bell, a member of St Peter's, and before long, Lesley had involved Kay in many things, including an event at church.

Being back in St Peter's felt natural to Kay. With time, she found her faith growing; something that had always been present but dormant was released and strengthened. She gradually committed her whole life to the Lord and is now thrilled that her faith is so important to her.

Hope to see you next year.



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

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


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
